The Christian church in South Africa played a very critical role in bringing down the demise of Apartheid and in ushering a new dawn of democracy. Christian leaders were very prophetic and at the forefront of driving transformation agenda among the poor, oppressed and vulnerable communities. The post-Apartheid South Africa, however, has witnessed a silent or weak voice of the church and its leaders in the face of many socio-economic and political challenges. What is considered prophetic, in the form of miracles and incredible happenings, has instead plunged the church into a religious crisis. Consequently, many are calling the church to reclaim its prophetic voice on one hand, and on the other hand a call to train and accredit church leaders is gaining momentum by day.
